





In the first free and fair elections since 1964, Dr. Jagan was elected President of Guyana on October 5, 1992 after the PPP/Civic emerged victorious with 54% of the votes. Exactly 39 years after he had first been removed from office, Cheddi Jagan was sworn in as President of Guyana on October 9, 1992 (above). He returned to office in a country demoralised by years of misgovernment, its population depleted by massive emigration, a huge international debt with consequent International Monetary Fund/World Bank restructuring policies in place, and an education system, once among the best in the Commonwealth Caribbean, in ruins.
