

Jagan Sees Guiana's Governor on Forming Regime

GEORGETOWN, British Guiana, Aug. 25—Sir Ralph Grey, the Governor of this British colony, and Dr. Cheddi B. Jagan, the leader of the People's Progressive party, conferred today on the formation of a government under a new constitution giving British Guiana internal self-government.

A Government House announcement said today that the two had discussed matters relating to the formation of a government and that Dr. Jagan would be on leave for a brief holiday. The talks will resume next Friday.

As a result of Monday's elections, Dr. Jagan's left-wing party will have twenty representatives in the thirty-

five-member Legislative Assembly. In the upper chamber, known as the State Council, it will have eight of thirteen seats.

For the first time in colony's history, an elected Prime Minister Dr. Jagan, will preside over Cabinet meetings. Previously the Governor, as the representative of the British Crown, presided.
