In accordance with para: 5 of D.D.G's loose minute dated 9th December 1957 to E, I now attach to the file cover cancellation forms for H.O.W. (Lettercheck) 11219 (Cheddi and Janet JAGAN). At the same time I am attaching for signature, if approved, the necessary forms for the imposition of a H.O.W. (Lettercheck) on Cheddi and Janet JAGAN. I have included on the application forms three addresses which are used by the JAGANs and which are currently effective on H.O.W. 11219.

2. The case against JAGAN has now altered since the recent review of H.O.W. 11219. JAGAN continues his policy of "sweet reasonableness" but this is, of course, in line with what LASCAR inferred when JAGAN visited the United Kingdom earlier this year - vide para: 5 of the attachment to serial 757z. In addition, when the S.L.O. was asked earlier this year for his views on whether or not we should cancel this H.O.W., he replied that the

X There are obvious points of comparison between the situation in Chana (then the Gold Coast colony) in April, 1948, and that in British Guiana since 1953. In both colonies the Constitution had to be suspended as a result of the activities of the Nationalist leaders. Both these leaders had achieved success at the leaders. polls without help from outside the colony and both had looked to the Communists of Great Britain and elsewhere as well as to other avoved anti-colonislists for savice and assistance, and had thought to remote in their own territories regimes on the Soviet and ast eropean sodel. Here, however, the similarity ceases. By 1948 NARUKAN had lost faith in the Communists whilst JaGAR, in spite of the lack of sesistance from either the British Communist Party or any international Communist front organisation at the time of the suspension of the Constitution in 1953, has remained a convinced Communist. No doubt this is due partly to the strong influence of his white, American-born wife, but there is a fundamental difference between Nakuman and JAGAR. The former is a sent african negro, to whom the advancement of his r ce is the first priority and his association with the Communists cas a passing phase. JaCak, on the oth r hand, is a sophisticated, highly intellectual cast Indian, t whom theories are at least as important as practiced possibilities. He has, no doubt, walcomed the references made at the 20th Congress of the ommunist carty of the coviet Union, (C. P. . in February, 1956, and again in the occleration of Communist rarties of ocielist countries, adopted in and corkers Boscow in Revember, 1957, to the possibility of achieving Socialist revolution by peaceful, parliamentar, means. It seems likely that now he is else watching closely Communist developments in India, particularly in the Communist-dominated State of Kerala, as well as studying the implications of the report on "Trade Union Tasks in the Fight Against Colonialism", which was delivered by S.A. DANGE, General Secretary of the All-India Trade Union Congress and Vice-President of the World Pederation of Trade Unions (F. T. U.), at the 4th World Trade Union Congress, held under S.F.T.U. auspices at Leipzig in October, 1957. A summary of this report was published in "Sorld Trade Union Movement", (organ of the World Pederation of Trade Unions), So.10, dated October, 1957. JAGAN's contact with W.F.T.U. dates back to 1951, when he was present as an observer at a W.P.T.U. Council Reeting in Serlin in November, and spoke of the need for a special department in the R.P.T.U. Secretariat to deal with colonial problems. 4. As regards paragraph 10 of the despatch, from the information aveilable to us, we also had come to the conclusion that it was unlikely that JAGAN would give up Communism unless he were convinced intellectually of the falsity of Communist doctrine, and the Communist Party of India were to suffer a severe setback. As is pointed out in paragraph 7 of the despatch, JAGAR is fully neare of the fact that outside the "hard-core", his followers are Mationalists, not Communists, and that the membership of the P.P.P. is made up of Magroes as well as Bast Indians. Revertheless, in the light of Communist pronouncements since Pebruary, 1956, on the possibility of a peacoful transition to Socialism, JAGAN may hope that a Communist-led Government of British Guiana, should that colony become a unit in the West Indies Federation (vide paragraph 7(viii) of the despatch), sould be able to play much the same role as the Communist-led Government of the State of Revale does today in India. 5. You may think that the Governor sould be interested to see a copy of Commonwealth Selations Office print P.S. 314/1 of 7th Sovember, 1957, on "India; Communism in Levala" and recent issues of "Asian Analyst". 6. We are sending copies of this letter to M.I.6. and to our 5.1.0. in Trinided for their information. We are sending the latter also a copy of the reprint of the report by DANGE mentioned in paragraph 3 above and of the report in the "Daily "elegraph" of the 3rd March, 1950, of an interview with Sankaran NARBUDINIPAD, Chief Minister of Lerals and a member of the Political Bureau of the Indian Communist Party. 

Last came to our notice in







In April 1953, the People's Progressive Party were elected to power in British Guiana under a new constitution with universal adult franchise and a ministerial system. In a country of challenging difficulties their young communist-inclined leaders had won their big following by unscrupulous demagogy, impossible promises and abuse (not entirely unjustified) of the established order. In October 1953, when it was clear that the Ministers were not attempting to work the constitution and that economic disaster and civil disorder were imminent, the constitution was suspended. The story is well known. The Robertse The Robertson Commission which reported on the suspension and found good reason for it, advised that there should be a period of marking time; "... so long as the P.P.P. retains its present leadership and policies there is no way in which any real measure of responsible government can be restored without the certainty that the country will again be subjected to constitutional crisis. From the beginning of 1954 until August 1957 the Government was carried on by the Governor with his senior officials and wholly nominated Executive and Legislative Councils. During this period, with advice from the World Bank, technical assistance from the U.S.A., and with generous financial aid from Great Britian, a greatly increased development programme was pushed forward; commercial confidence was largely restored; by able leadership in the Secretariat combined with a great effort in the Colonial Office to recruit experienced cfficers, the Government Services were strengthened and improved; vigorous efforts were made to teach the electorate to understand the problems with which the country was faced. This interim government, nominated instead of elected, could never be popular. It was much maligned by the elected leaders who had been ousted. There were disappointments and delays, mistakes and misadventures. But it probably did more for the country than any other government during British rule. As the shortages of man-power and material were gradually overcome, heartening progress began to be visible in town and country on nearly every side of governmental endeavour. The progress was not fast enough for the extremist agitators turned out of office who had nothing to do but criticise; but it was fast The Right Honourable Alan Lennox-Boyd, P.C., M.P., Colonial Office. enough to alter the revolutionary feeling of frustration and desperation which had nurtured the 1953 hotheads and to replace it by nothing more than the normal grumbling of a friendly and reasonably administered people in a very difficult country. There were new and encouraging signs of a spirit of co-operation and self-help and of less dependence on the central government. On the industrial and agricultural side there were record sugar crops, a record rice crop and other signs of expension. The Sugar Industry continued to plough back vast sums to rehabilitate their factories and to improve wages and housing and welfare. The Trade Union movement was strengthened and consolidated and industrial relations were good. The Demerara Bauxite Company after detailed negotiations with the Government decided to invest about £13m. in establishing an alumina plant and an impressive start was made on the construction work. They also carried out costly surveys of hydro-electric possibilities. A new company was formed with English, Canadian and American capital to exploit deposits of manganese in the North West District. new small factories were built and brought into production. Arrangements were made for an oil survey in the marine areas. In spite of the constitutional set-back, revenue was buoyant and the economy was expanding.

But the problem of British Guiana remained. Good government or comparatively good government, is in the colonies today no substitute for popular government. Hopes were raised by a split in the People's Progressive Party. Dr. Jagan found himself left with the East Indian followers, mostly in the country districts, while Mr. Burnham took with him the African and urban following. But the overwhelming political support for these two unreliable leaders remained, even if they were in opposition instead of together. The disapproval of the western world and the dangers of communist leadership meant no more to the mass of the electorate than the achievements of the nominated government. The split had only emphasized the dangers of racialism in the country's politics. They were the only leaders, other than an unpromising coalition of moderates, who had any chance of forming a popular government in any future elections and they were learning nothing of the art of government. They were in their long-favoured role of being critics only, vicious and irresponsible critics, with plenty of time to plan and organize their forces. As the frustrations of "marking time" were prolonged, their support from the unthinking electorate was growing instead of diminishing. While other colonial territories, and notably the nearby West Indian territories,
were advancing, British Guiana was getting no nearer
to self government. The Commission's recommendation
of marking time was all very well when it was pronounced. But whatever the discipline, you cannot
mark time for ever. mark time for ever.

- The puzzle facing Her Majesty's Government and the Governor was how to devise a possible way back to the path of constitutional progress without endangering such stability as had been regained: how to make or break those who were clearly the favourite leaders by giving them real responsibility without damaging too much the returning confidence of the people, commercial investors and those western governments on which British Guiana depends. A solution was sought by a modification of the constitution which produced a half-way stage. It reintroduced elected members with the full franchise as before, together with the ministerial system. enabled the Governor to put the responsibility clearly on those elected, although everybody knew that he had sufficient power through additional nominations and other means to counterbalance irresponsibility if necessary. A delicate balance had to be found which would reassure the western world of Great Britain's determination not to tolerate the growth of communism or one-party rule. but which was not so weighted against the popular leaders as to make it advantageous for them to cause a deadlock by refusing to stand for election or to take office.
- S. The balance was found. The proposals were roundly abused by all local politicians, but the elections were held in August, 1957. The moderate leaders failed to combine. Dr. Jagan, who was always sure to win the most seats, won an overall majority. On being assured of an original working majority both in Executive Council and in Legislative Council, he agreed to take office. His half-hearted effort to persuade Mr. Burnham to join him in a National Government failed. He and four other members of his party, including his American-born wife, Janet, were appointed to Ministries and the responsibility for the country's progress is thus clearly on the shoulders of an elected leader. Mr. Burnham is also in the public eye with a measure of responsibility as Leader of the Opposition. Both erstwhile critics are facing realities under mutual criticism. Since taking office, whatever their long-term aims and whatever their feelings of frustration and confinement, the Ministers have pursued a moderate policy; in spite of their communist leanings and their administrative inexperience, in the face of considerable financial difficulties and of growing political criticism they are trying very hard to govern the country sensibly and to avoid crises. Commerce and industry and the government services have shown most praise-worthy patience and goodwill and there has been no noticeable recession of trade or investment.
- 6. When this result was achieved there were many who asked what had been gained by again subjecting British Guiana to a government of inexperienced and ill-educated upstarts led by a

/small

small communist-trained core. The answer is that there is again the chance of finding a responsible elected government. A country which has once entrusted its choice of leaders to the ballotbox must not despair however comic the figures which that jack-in-the-box throws up. Until the box is closed again for the next election, the joker is king. But there is a school for jokers. As has been mentioned, so long as there are democratic processes, responsibility makes or breaks. This is not the same country as it was in 1953. The suspension of the constitution administered a shock which will not quickly be forgotten. In 1953 the P.P.P. did not try to be responsible; they thought they could sweep away colonialism by popular emotion. Now they know that Great Britain takes her colonial responsibilities seriously. They have hung the labels of extremism and communism around their necks. Everybody is wary and suspicious. They know that another constitutional crisis which was clearly their fault would kill them politically. They can only remain in the vanguard of the "national liberation movement" if they succeed as a government. In the meantime the country has learnt that it has no hope of higher living standards without increased investment and that any behaviour which drives away capital is suicidal. We have seen the unusual picture of the communist Jagan, both before and after the election, competing with all other parties and politicians to attract and re-assure capitalist commercial investors. He has now to lead a country which for all its mass electorate voting on emotional and racial grounds, has freedom of the press and freedom of speech and a large number of vociferous people who are beginning to understand the political and economic facts of life in the western hemisphere. He is remarkably sensitive to public criticism and in his first six months has discontinued several cherished plans because of it.

alternative elected government to Jagan. If for political or constitutional advantage, or because he is desperate at the opposition or the difficulties of administration, Dr. Jagan throws in his hand, we are almost back to where we started in 1954. Such a resignation is an ever-present danger. The official opposition is at present incapable of forming an effective government. It is far too much occupied with clever vote-catching pinpricks and insincerities even to realise that it has the task of showing itself a possible alternative government. The Governor would have no alternative but to mark time again with a largely nominated government. To Jagan is a devoted Marxist whose whole adult thinking

/and

and study, both economic and political, have been anti-colonial, anti-British and pro-Russian. He is not likely to change his beliefs. The battle is not for his beliefs but for his actions as a popular leader in the circumstances in which he finds himself. He is a theorist, not a practical administrator and the battle will be long drawn out. Lord Wavell said "when things are going badly in battle the best tonic is to take one's mind off one's own troubles by considering what a rotten time one's opponent must be having." Dr. Jagan has the responsibility firmly on his shoulders. If there has to be a return to a nominated government, he will have failed. It is part of his party policy to pretend that he is only "participating" in the government and that without the restrictions of Colonial Office control he could fulfil all the dreams of the people. But few believe it. He knows he is on trial and he is very much conscious of the following worries:

- (1) he dare not cause another constitutional crisis unless he can find an issue in which the whole people will be behind him;
- (2) he dare not openly pursue radical policies which will discourage investment and development capital;
- (3) he knows that, outside the hard-core, his followers are nationalists and not communists and that if he is caught out in blatantly communist action or intention it will not only damage his chances of constitutional advance and ruin his hopes of investment and development capital but will also lose him political support;
- (4) his party is devoid of second-line leaders. The small communist core or inner party dominates the executive. There is nobody with any pretensions to leadership at the central government level in the lower half of the executive or in the rank and file. Indeed he knows that the present Ministers are hardly up to their job. He himself is a theorist and a dialectitian. He has not yet got around to producing practical policies. Too much depends on him and he is not equipped to translate thought into action;
- (5) if he does produce practical policies, for all his dreams of an all-powerful party machine, he must eventually have the worry, even if it is not yet realised, that to carry out his policies successfully he must depend on Executive Council officials and the government services. The government services are largely Burnhamite. They are nationalistic and progressive but they hold Dr. Jagan under grave suspicion and he has done little in the last six months to lessen that suspicion;
- (6) his natural leaning to agriculture and the rural areas where his East Indian supporters are strong is being exploited by the unscrupulous opposition in such a way as to bring increasing danger of open racial conflict. Dr. Jagan fully

realises the disaster which this would bring to the country but has not yet found a way to counter it effectively:

- (7) his original idea, prompted from Ghana, was probably to win early constitutional advance by good behaviour and then to try to establish the Marxist paradise of his dreams. But he is being brought to realise that the struggle will not have ended if and when he turns out the British and wins "independence"; if he then reverted to being an acknowledged communist pursuing communist policies he would undoubtedly be suppressed by the American states and his country would probably lose its identity with him:
- (8) he is in a difficult position about Federation. He is realising more and more how difficult it is to see any future sovereignty or independent economic stability for British Guiana, except as a unit of the West Indies Federation. The Opposition and most African Guianese are clamorously in favour of joining immediately. But Federation is emotionally unpopular with the East Indian supporters on whom he and his party must rely for election. If any Government or politician tries to force a decision too early it may add fuel to the dangerous flickerings of racialism. He can only play for time, and hope not to be overtaken by events.
- The policy for Her Majesty's Government and the Governor is comparatively clear. So long as there is no stable alternative elected government, in order to avoid the sterile reversion to marking time, we must support the Jagan government wholeheartedly and give our best advice and help. We must in doing so explain the dangers of his communism and of any actions which will discourage or hold back economic advance or otherwise destroy the confidence of those on whom we depend. At the same time throughout the country we must build up faith in parliamentary democracy and the rule of law and our western way of life. We must strengthen and ensure the growth and continuance of an informed and effective press and opposition. We must encourage sound trade unionism which is not dominated by the political party in power. With the help of the British information services and the British Council and the United States information services, we must continue to help people to be more politically discriminating and in particular to recognise the threat of communism and efforts to suppress the opposition. Through good intelligence services (which at present we are fortunate to possess) we must, whenever we get the chance, expose Jagan in each and every communist step or contact. We must go on maintaining and, if possible, increasing the quality and morals of the government services

/both

both in the secretariats, the departments and in the ministries. We must go on spreading throughout the country, however ill-informed the electorate, the better knowledge of economic facts and of the future alternatives with which British Guiana is faced. To spread real understanding of the advantages and possible disadvantages of joining the Federation of the West Indies must be among our leading endeavours.

- 9. These things we must do while maintaining the confidence and the assistance of commerce and industry and investors. We must do them, including the encouragement of a strong and informed opposition, without damaging our relations with our ministerial colleagues or allowing racialism to get out of hand. Above all we must succeed in securing the necessary aid and development capital from the United Kingdom and the U.S.A. and, if possible, Canada, to enable our development programme to be continued and completed and to be extended to the next stage beyond 1960 when the time comes. A slowing down or cessation of the development programme will win an inflammable sympathy for Dr. Jagan wider than his own party, which he might well exploit successfully. Our whole position locally depends on our being able to convince everybody that we are giving him a fair chance.
- 10. If Dr. Jagan can keep going without economic or constitutional crises, whether or not he has any real achievements to his credit, the pressure will grow for constitutional advance. Particularly if we succeed in avoiding the reversion to a nominated government, popular opinion will not be satisfied for long that British Guiana should be behind Jamaica and Trinidad and Barbados. Whatever the pressure, we must maintain ultimate control through the continuance of checks and balances and reserve powers until one of the following three things occurs:-
- (a) Dr. Jagan gives up communism and becomes a capable, practical nationalist in the context of the western hemisphere. From my personal knowledge of him I judge this to be very unlikely.
- (b) Dr. Jagan, while retaining his personal ideologies and his political leadership, realizes that communism is impossible in a country the size of British Guiana on the American continent even if the country is independent rather than colonial. If he realises this he may possibly be lead as a nationalist into practical policies which provide the chance of an honourable future for British Guiana. He might even acquire the habit.
- (c) Dr. Jagan and his party are discredited and there is a non-racial elected opposition strong enough and sensible enough to take over the government of the country and lead it safely to self-government.

11. To summarise, we have put the extremists on the spot. Dr. Jagan is at present the only possible elected leader; he and his party must show on the spot. their followers what they can do instead of merely criticising all the attempts of others. While they are making this effort it is better to keep them in power than to revert to a nominated government. are doing everything possible, not without some success, to produce a lasting atmosphere and understanding in British Guiana of all that goes to make up parliamentary democracy and western ways of life. Dr. Jagan is unlikely to alter his communist beliefs, but in his efforts to bring his country to selfgovernment and in his knowledge that the followers on whom he depends for electoral support are nationalist rather than communist, he may grow to appreciate that neither before nor after independence is communism a practicable form of government in our geographical and economic circumstances. Alternatively in his efforts to walk his tight-rope and in his lack of governmental experience and competent lieutenants he may lose popularity while his opponents get together and form a non-racial party capable of running the country.

12. We are going somewhere now instead of marking time. We need a great deal of patience to wait and see where we are going. But the difficulties are no longer all on our side.

Torture in North-East Ireland DO YOU STAND FOR THIS?

The following is reprinted from a statement of the Republican publicity bureau in Dublin:

Four Coalisland, Co. Tyrone, youths, KEVIN MALLON, JAMES O'GONNELL, FRANCIS TALBOT and JOHN O'NEILL, were arrested at various times on Monday, November 18th, and Tuesday, November 19th, by the R.U.C.

They were taken to Dungannon Barracks where the first interrogations began at 7.30 p.m. on November 19th and lasted until midnight. They received no meals and a request for tea was ignored.

They were questioned continuously by relays of three men and in the course of the first questioning were beaten with fists, punched in the stomach and face, caught by the hair and their heads banged against the wall.

At 12:10 a.m. they were taken from Dungannon Barracks and informed they were being moved to Belfast. They were handcuffed. Somewhere between Lurgan, Co. Armagh, and Lisburn the cars swung up a by-road and stopped. The youths were removed from the cars and again beaten on the roadside.

In Belfast they were taken to Crumlin Road R.U.C. Barracks. The time was about 2 a.m. Wednesday. November 20th, Relays of interrogators now pounced on them. The questions are couched in the foulest language.

They were threatened that their homes would be destroyed and their families thrown on the streets, that their brothers would be put away for 20 years, that it made no difference who was got but that "someone was going to be got for the Brackaville job and it might as well be them."

The interrogation took the following form:

One of the four would be returned to a cell after about three-quarters of an hour of beatings combined with threats and questions. He would hear clearly the screams of his comrades and the shouled oaths and threats of the police.

The police would roar the following:

- (1) "You are a dirty, rotten Communist."
- (2) "Your mother is nothing but a ———"
 (3) "You killed Sergeant Ovens."
- (4) "No man ever went through our hands that we didn't break. And we're going to break you."

When one of the youths returned to his cell in the dark and lay on the bunk he discovered the pillow was covered in blood. A detective followed and said: "This is the sheet that covered Ovens." And he added: "It will cover another body

The interrogation continued all through the night. Between five and six the four were returned to their cells. They were in bad shape physically and mentally.

At 6 a.m. they were pulled out of their cells. Squads of three men now started the questioning in relays. Cocked revolvers were placed against the stomachs, throats and temples of the youths. Sticks were pressed into their bodies. Handkerchiefs were twisted around their necks. A cloth soaked in a foul-smelling liquid was pushed against their tacks while their noses were held. They were thrown on the floor, their arms pinioned, the cloth around the neck was woven tighter and tighter. Then it would be snapped and they'd be told "to confess."

Now they were beaten around the head and body with rubber truncheons. These beatings continued in different forms throughout all day Wednesday and from midnight to 6 a.m. Thursday morning. They were returned to their cells and put in solitary confinement.

A detective whom they had not seen before rushed into the cells almost immediately and acted like a maniac. He clawed all over them. He said: "Tm Ovens I'll haunt you for the rest of your lives"

After this they were taken out of the cells and the torture and questioning began again. This went on through Thursday.

They were told the torture and ceaseless questioning would continue until they signed the statements the R.U.C. had prepared.

Mentally and physically exhausted from the torture, constant questioning, lack of food and sleep, fearful of its continuation and what might befall their families they eventually "admitted" anything the police wanted them to admit. They signed the statements.

Any of these days now they may stand in the dock charged with the murder of Ovens. The torture mill confessions will be used to send them—and others—to the scaffold.

The British Guiana Police have sent us the following information about BALDEO.

He is of East Indian origin and was born on 14 March, 1933 at Skeldon Estate Hospital. He comes from a reputable East Indian Estate family, attended the Skeldon Lutheran High School and in 1948 passed the Junior Cambridge Examination. He was studying to take the Senior Cambridge School Certificate Examination but fell ill and had to leave school in 1950.

In 1953 he worked in the Skeldon sugar factory as a porter, but left after about a year. He was unemployed for a time and then in 1956 he obtained employment as a store-keeper at the Springlands Housing Scheme where he worked for about six months.

On 30 July, 1957, he left for the United Kingdom to seek employment, and was issued with a British Passport, No. 18885, under the name of SEEWDHAR. Apparently he assumed his proper name on arrival in the United Kingdom.

For several years before his departure for England he was an ordinary member of the PEOPLE'S PROGRESSIVE PARTY (P.P.P.), but never held executive rank. He was, however, always closely associated with two well-known P.P.P. members - NASRUDEEN (our PF. 1445) and Mohamed KHAN (mentioned in our PF. 1228 of 1 December, 1954). NASRUDEEN was charged with sedition in 1954 and was defended by D.N. PRITT, Q.C., who came out from England for this purpose. Mohamed KHAN was charged with taking part in an illegal procession in New Amsterdam. Both of them are at loggerheads with the Party Executives at the present moment and are regarded as being unreliable hotheads.

The British Guiana Police would be glad to know if BALDEO comes to notice at all while in the United Kingdom.



10. Dr. Jagan was guest speaker at an indoor meeting of the Party held on 4th October, at which there was an unusually large attandance of 27 persons. Among those attending were John Poon and Norbert Patron who recently resigned from the party. At this meeting Jagan's assurance that his political convictions had not changed did much for the 'comrades' waning morale which had suffered a shock when the Honourable Ebenezer Joshua of St. Vincent joined the Democratic Labour Party of the West Indies (D.L.P.W.I.) With a good leadership for P.P.P. Jagan thought that he could accomplish much for the people of British Guiana. He inferred that the Guianese wanted progressive legislation but that since P.P.P. leaders were not running the Government, such legislation could not be initiated by them. Jagan's chief complaint was a lack of second-line leaders within the P.P.P., which he felt would operate against his doing all he had planned to do.
