ing the premier— she served as Minister of Housing, Labour, and Home Affairs. However, in 1953 the Constitution was suspended and Cde Janet was thrown in jail for about six months. She was the mother of little Joey then.

None of these adverse setbacks daunted her spirits to continue the struggle with her husband and comrades of the PPP when in opposition for almost three decades. Cde Janet held the position of Editor-in-Chief of the Mirror and continued her political career by meeting and listening to people's problems at Freedom House. She is still active in this field.
